After a few years in banking she took an interesting job for the State in Olympia creating birth certificates for people born in the late 1800s or early 1900s.

She moved to Seattle in 1955, again was employed in banking, and got married in 1966. The marriage produced two children, Mark in 1960 and Shari in 1965. After her divorce in 1970 she met Dick Beck on a blind date. They married in 1973.

Dick had built a small A-Frame cabin in Baring and shared his dream of adding on to have a view of Mt. Baring. Anyone who ever visited appreciated the masterpiece they built in Riverwood Park where they lived for 30+ years and enjoyed many great friendships. She served as Riverwood treasurer for 12 years, and Dick managed the well system there.

Historic Skykomish Hotel Is Coming Back Strong

People who care about Skykomish almost universally care about the fate of Skykomish Hotel, the iconic building that dominates most views of Railroad Avenue and teetered on its deathbed for years.

That the building stands today is in part due to King County Tax dollars at work.

For nearly a decade citizens and visitors alike watched in modest horror as "The Hotel" deteriorated bit by bit, flying shingle by flying shingle, until the town finally acquired it from the previous owner for back taxes owed and called for proposals from private developers to save the building. A group called "Revive - Historic Skykomish" took a five-year lease with an option to extend and buy the building at the end.

Sky resident and builderTodd Brunner had been asked to determine if the hotel could be saved structurally. Once that was established, grants from 4Culture and a King Co. preservation fund paid to reroof the building and paint the outside to protect it from more weather. Todd says aside from some stout vertical timbers and floor joists, most of the interior was mush due to years of water coming through the failing roof, but eventually things were stabilized and rehabilitation work could begin. Ultimately Todd bought the lease from Revive and began clearing out the mush and shoring things up.

In the process he hired Monica (Mo) Ainsley for some of the the cleanup, and as he saw her work ethic and willingness to learn, she smoothly transitioned from carpenter's assistant to an able carpenter and ultimately worked alongside Todd as they rebuilt the entire ground floor inside the building.

An important goal at that point was to establish a revenue stream. Vail Resorts had recently purchased Stevens Pass ski area, but Todd quickly learned creating housing for their employees





would be a non-starter given Vail's corporate style, so he and Mo became partners in **Sky River Coffee**, which has been a successful enterprise from the beginning. Doing their best to preserve historically significant aspects during the rebirth of the hotel, the tables in the coffeeshop are made from unmilled 2 by 14 planks that originally supported the hotel's upper floors. **Skykomish Outfitters** also now rents the sourtheast corner space on the ground floor old timers will remember as "The Drugstore."

After considerable research visiting restored classic hotels in Montana and elsewhere, Todd learned there is a significant market for upscale lodging in traditional style establishments, so that is the future planned for Skykomish Hotel.

As an historically designated building, alterations to the exterior require strict design review, but happily permission has been granted to add balconies at the back of the building to offer a A far cry from the crumbling edifice seen at the left, with the new roof and exterior paint Skykomish Hotel was ready for the complete interior make-over that will continue over the next 18 months.

mirror image double-balcony look, just like the front of the building, to people crossing the bridge into town.

There will be six rooms each on the second and third floors, plus three penthouse suites on the fourth. They will all feature fireplaces and a kitchenette. The hotel lobby in the space between the coffee shop and the outfitters is being designed to feel as if you are walking into an upscale hotel in the 1920s including a period chandelier and all the trimmings. SHS will be working with Todd to select appropriate period photos for the lobby. An elevator is being installed. In the 21st. century one cannot expect penthouse suite patrons to walk up three flights of stairs.

Sky River Coffee will expand to sandwiches and other lunch offerings and a dining patio is planned for the northwest corner of the Hotel.

All this is expected to happen in the next 18 months, at which point historic Skykomish Hotel will finally again contribute to the allure of Sky as a destination for travelers and vacationers.

Sky Artworks Opens at Maloneys

An exciting new neighbor has arrived next door to our museum in the main room of Historic Maloney's Store.

The mission of Sky Artworks is to promote the creative community in the Upper Sky Valley by providing production, exhibition, educational, marketing, and professional development resources for artists, artisans, and tech creatives, including a gift shop where artists can sell their work.

In addition to being a classy, attractive gallery displaying and selling art, Sky Artworks is focused on being a community center for both the arts and artists. They provide membership-based access to work space for artists, collaboration opportunities, supplies, and exhibition spaces.

Operating as a non-profit under the 501 c 3 aegis of Third Place Technologies, Sky Artworks is a joint venture with the town to expand Sky's appeal as a destination for all kinds of activities.

Offering a large format printer, laser cutter, vinyl cutter, 3D printer, DSLR camera and more, Sky Artworks will provide artists tools they would rarely be able to afford on their own.

In addition to workspace for artists Sky Artworks will offer classes and workshops on a variety of topics including creative skills, tech skills, and professional development.

They also keep the space available for the town and others to host community events.

M.C.T. Update

Maloney Creek Trail (MCT), conveniently located near Skykomish Post Office at the end of Thelma St. provides a simple, safe, and beautiful "walk in the woods" opportunity to get outdoors.

Spring wildflowers are in bloom all along the wooded, short (.2 mile), disability access trail overlooking rushing, tumbling Maloney Creek. It's trail cleanup time. Clearing out scattered branches on the trail as you walk will be appreciated by USFS, Town, SEI, and fellow hikers.

Slow bikes and dogs on leash are allowed. Please keep dogs under control and clean up after them. There are poop bags and waste cans at the trailhead.

Additional interpretive signage is designed and ready for production and installation this summer. The USFS and Sound Salmon Solutions are contributing grantors for this Town of Sky sign project.

This fall we hope to be again visited by spawning salmon in Maloney Creek.

He and wife Sandi live on the East Hill of Kent on a small farm where she used
